The Computer Fraud and Abuse Act (CFAA) is a United States cybersecurity bill that was enacted in 1986 as an amendment to existing computer fraud law (18 U.S.C. § 1030), which had been included in the Comprehensive Crime Control Act of 1984. The law prohibits accessing a computer without authorization, or in excess of authorization.

Computer Fraud and Abuse Act of 1986 - Amends the Federal criminal code to change the scienter requirement from "knowingly" to "intentionally" for certain offenses regarding accessing the computer files of another. Aside from obvious situations like hacking into someone's account, it also criminalizes certain computer-related acts, such as denial-of-service attacks and malware distribution.

The CFAA, enacted in 1986 as an amendment to the Counterfeit Access Device and Computer Fraud and Abuse Act, provides criminal penalties and civil remedies for intrusions into "protected computers." "Protected computers" are broadly defined to include computers used by or for financial institutions and the U.S. government or any computer that is used in or affects interstate or foreign commerce. 18 U.S.C. § 1030 (e) (2).
